

The event was held at Central Middle School in Dover on March 5 and went extremely well with State Officers having the opportunity to serve as judges for the first time. When this news was shared at our Advisory Committee meeting, there was a growing interest in more schools participating at the middle school level. We're looking forward to seeing how HOSA can reach even more future health professionals.

HOSA Idol of the Year

The HOSA Idol Award is presented to an individual student who makes a significant contribution to Delaware HOSA and is recommended by the State Officer team. This year's HOSA Idol was awarded to Morgan Heritage from Hodgson. Morgan is a mature young woman who represents HOSA in every way by being a leader, a contributor, and a hard worker. She is very enthusiastic about HOSA and always brings that enthusiasm and a loving personality with her to every HOSA event.

Hands-On Exhibitors

Respiratory Therapist Janice Ellis, had a swarm of people around the Christiana Care Respiratory Care exhibit during this year's Health Fair. A set of pig lungs were used to allow the students to see what real lungs look and feel like, and see how respirations expand the lungs. The "sick" lungs displayed areas of the lung that were not being ventilated, as well as areas that were damaged. By comparing the lungs side by side the differences of how your lungs should expand equally with each breath could easily be seen. Respiratory Therapy is a health career avenue that a motivated student could explore.

In the sixth grade, most kids my age wanted to be professional athletes when they grew up. However, I wanted to be a dentist. At the time it was just a dream, but HOSA has allowed me to come much closer to making this dream a reality. I've learned how far a simple dream can push one to succeed. Hours upon hours have been spent with my nose in a dental book, practicing clinical skills in my schools dental clinic, and stressing over my event, Dental Science. When I first competed as a sophomore, I would have never thought that this organization would change my life the way that it has.

When I first competed as a sophomore, I was quite intimidated by my competition, most of which consisted of individuals older than myself. All I could do was study hard and believe in myself. NLC is an experience like no other. The first NLC I attended was in Nashville, TN. Walking into the opening ceremony was exhilarating, thousands of students and advisors cheering and waving light-up objects, all coming together as health professionals. I went to the Washington Leadership Academy, where I became friends with other state officers from New Jersey to Hawaii, many of which I still speak to today. Rare Disease Day

The first ever Rare and Chronic Disease Research Event took place on Friday, February 27, 2015.

Eight teams of two students were paired with researchers, clinicians, patients and families to learn about their chosen rare disease. They then developed a visual display (modeled after the Health Career Display CE) of a specific rare or chronic disease, defined it, and proposed a possible cure/treatment or way to improve a quality-of-life issue related to their chosen rare disease. In addition, there was a fundraising component factored into the scoring. Nemours set a goal of \$2,000 for this event but that was far exceeded as donations reached over \$5,500!

The top three teams were awarded HOSA medals and were given a monetary prize courtesy of Nemours. In addition, first place team members were presented with trophies by Terry Pedicone, Administrative Program Manager, Nemours Biomedical Research on the final day of our State Leadership Conference at Delaware State University.

Students and advisors have shared that the experience went far beyond a competitive event. Bonds were formed between students and the families they were partnered with and a few even attended the event. There was a great sense of pride in the work that was done and it's provided our students with a truly valuable experience.

Everyone involved declared the event was a "huge success." We are not only excited to working with Nemours again next year, but have made steps to bring RDD to the National level in hopes to expand HOSA's involvement.

Put Down Your Pencils?

Delaware Advisors are considering the switch to online testing in years to come. This year we added seven new written tests to our schedule, which increases the need for resources. Moving these tests to a computer lab at the school level will eliminate the need for copies, transportation, time away from school for both students and advisors, food cost as well as sharpened #2 pencils! While the talks are still at the exploratory stage, it seems both environmentally friendly as well as resource conscious to further pursue this as an option for our Round 1 tests only. Other written tests would remain the same and be taken at the conference location.

Community Service News

The Delaware HOSA State Officers partnered with the Glasgow Lions Club to support the collection of eyeglass. The students sorted over 2,000 pairs of eyeglasses and an assortment of vision and hearing devices. Eyeglasses are collected and the State Officers sorted the glasses into different categories including:



- Prescription eyeglasses
- Nonprescription sunglasses
- Prescription sunglasses

The Lion's Club ships nonprescription sunglasses to parts of the world where the sun affects the development of cataracts. The prescription eyeglasses and prescription sunglasses will be cleaned, repaired, and shipped to parts of the world where vision care is limited.

The State Officers also sold Charity Links in their schools and communities. The funds raised from the Charity Links were forwarded to the Lions Eye Bank of Delaware Valley. Since 1957, The Lions Eye Bank of Delaware Valley has been instrumental in providing over 35,000 sight restoring corneal transplants! Through a matching contributions program, Delaware HOSA's donation to the Lions Eye Bank of Delaware Valley was \$925.00!
